
What other people can do:

Voting at the Polling Station

You will be asked for:

- Your name
- Your address
- Your Photo ID

If you do not have photo ID, you can apply for free voter ID at: www.gov.uk/apply-for-photo-id-voter-authority-certificate

We must receive your application by 5pm, 6 working days before the election you want to vote in.

You can fill in the form on the next page and give the booklet to the staff in the polling station, so they can help you.

There will be easy read guides, large print ballot papers, magnifying glasses and other accessible equipment at the polling station to help you to vote.
