MEET THE NEW SOUTH TYNESIDE CABINET


A new Cabinet has been announced to steer South Tyneside Council through the next year.


The new refreshed Cabinet will allow us to tackle the biggest and most fundamental issues our residents are facing.

Financially secure

- Develop the South Tyneside Pledge to include the promotion of good quality work and fair pay to address financially insecurity in the long-term.
- Maximise benefit take-up, and taking support to local community settings.
- Support carers to return to work including through accessible career opportunities and support to remain in paid employment.
- Ensuring access to specialist debt and welfare advice and provide advice, signposting and referral support for fuel and household bills and access to free and low-cost furniture.



Healthy and well

Residents will enjoy good mental wellbeing and physical health throughout their lives. They will have the best start in life and be able to live and age well.




- Mortimer School Expansion Additional classrooms, science laboratories and food technology areas to accommodate the increase in pupil numbers.
- Seaview School Expansion Invest in an additional classroom which will provide a more specialist environment for the SEND children to be taught and supported.
- Playground Equipment Replacement equipment over the next 5 years including new accessible playground equipment for users with disabilities to make playgrounds inclusive for all
- Road Safety Improvements Around schools- A programme of works to improve road safety for school children outside the front of schools.

Connected to jobs

Residents will have access to good quality jobs, skills, and learning.



- Local Transport Plan External funding from the Department for Transport which includes an element of pothole funding. The monies are utilised for carriageway resurfacing and road safety initiatives.
- Road Resurfacing An ongoing project to fund a 10-year recovery plan to reduce the highway repair backlog and slow further deterioration.
- Flags to Flexible Footways This project will deliver the Council's long-term plan to improve and regenerate the condition of the footway network across the borough.



Part of strong communities

Residents will live in clean, green, and connected communities where they feel safe.



- Decent Homes (Housing) Planned maintenance programme to maintain properties at the South Tyneside Decency standard. Programme improvement works include (but are not limited to) replacement kitchens, bathrooms, heating, window and roof replacements.
- Stronger Shores The project aims to improve benefits of kelp, seagrass and native habitats with regards to coastal erosion, flood risk, climate change, biodiversity management, water quality and wider social benefits.
- Disabled adaptations (Housing) The Council provides support across both private and public housing stock to people with disabilities need to make changes to their home for example to widen doors and install grab rails, improve garden access, improve access to rooms and facilities such as shower access or build extensions for example a bedroom downstairs.
- Flood & Coastal Risk Management- Undertake the appropriate appraisal work and feasibility studies in determining the most suitable option to mitigate flood and coastal erosion risk to vulnerable areas during extreme rainfall events
- Three Community Engagement Officers to tackle issues such as recycling, energy efficiency and crime and safety across South Tyneside.

And we are committed to:

Targeting support to make things fairer -

We will target support at the residents and parts of our borough that need it the most, reducing inequalities and making things fairer.

• Children's Residential and Assessment Centre - A new purpose-built children's assessment centre and two residential children's homes in South Tyneside. This will provide additional capacity to ensure more children from South Tyneside are able to be supported within the borough.



















Town Centre Blueprint taking shape

The views and ideas of almost 1,300 residents are being built into a new blueprint for South Shields town centre.

The full masterplan will be launched in the summer, with a series of engagement events planned. This was the first in a series of 'Conversations', with further consultation and masterplanning for Hebburn and Jarrow planned for later this year.

Local people aged 12 to 75 took part in the South Tyneside Conversation survey and helped to shape an emerging masterplan for the future of the town.

Pop up cafes and shops, a cycle hub on the ferry landing, green spaces, retail space for small businesses and more activity at the market place with a food hall and recreational activities are all being considered as the plan takes shape.

Consistent themes emerged from the public consultation, with residents asking for better variety of shops, a relocated College, quality green spaces, a refurbished Customs House, investment in the market place and more spaces for small local retailers to set up shop.

The masterplan will also explore opportunities for outdoor exhibition space, play activities and public art along King Street and seek to boost activity at the marketplace - building on significant investment in recent years.

In the 'Southern Gateway' zone, to the south of King Street, three out of five people surveyed supported the idea of new homes and green spaces, so these ideas will be taken forward into the masterplan.

Work has been ongoing since 2021 to acquire land and properties needed to facilitate the delivery of new homes in this area, using £6m awarded to the council from the Future High Streets

Upper floors of commercial premises could be repurposed to create homes, along with potential new residential development on Charlotte Street, Winchester Street and Mount Terrace.

The site of the former Central Library is also likely to house new student accommodation, with demolition of the building about to get underway imminently.

This is one piece of the jigsaw in the regeneration of our borough.

Over 100 residents visited the library, along with representatives from South Tyneside Council, South Tyneside Homes, Groundwork and volunteers at the Salvation Armv.

Volunteers from West Boldon Lodge offered a stall where children could make bird feeders and name disks. There was an opportunity to learn about how to reduce energy consumption and find out about Active Travel with Bikeability and Wheel Education.

Pupils at local schools designed Eco-posters. Pupils from five local schools put forward their creations to be judged. The winner was from West Boldon Primary, with Cleadon Academy's entry the runner up.

Council's Commitment to Journey of Improvement

The Council is absolutely committed to doing everything we can to support our young people, to provide a safe, healthy environment where children are given the security they need to develop and flourish, and to be able to realise their hopes and dreams.

Following recent inspection, Children's services have been rated "Inadequate" by Ofsted, an unexpected result for the Council after a strong series of inspections in previous years.

Whilst we accept the rating and where we have fallen short, Ofsted outlined some precise and specific areas of concern which they deemed serious enough to bring the overall judgement down despite good practice noted in many areas.

We are already motoring on with our journey of improvement, Inspectors recognised that the Council has been quick to take decisive action and has already made significant changes to ensure we can develop services for children and young people of the highest possible standard.

Steps have been taken to address the main concerns noted and scrutiny of management has already been tightened. Families can be assured that decision-making is now robust. Additional placements in registered children's homes have been found and plans are already in place for two new children's homes and an assessment centre in South Tyneside.

Despite the overall rating, inspectors noted improvements in some areas since the 2017 inspection, such as improved response to children who are missing or at risk of exploitation, improvements to the quality of children's plans, children's participation, and the quality of supervision in the leaving care team. The Council's team of social workers were recognised as passionate and committed.

Ofsted highlighted a wide range of positive activity within Children's services. Mockingbird constellations are noted as a service strength, with children and foster carers benefiting from the nurture and support that the programme brings.

The Virtual School are relentless in pursuing education outcomes for most children in our care.

Service users spoke positively about South Tyneside Children's Services. Some children take part in a range of participation activities and contribute to the development of services



through groups such as Making a Great Important Change (MAGIC) and the Care Leavers Council.

Inspectors also acknowledged the generous local offer provided to care leavers in South Tyneside which young people know how to access. Care leavers also benefit from long-standing relationships with their Personal Advisers who know them extremely well and can offer support on a range of issues from employment to mental health.

Ofsted also found that most disabled children receive effective support and planning, which means they live with carefully selected and committed carers while those needing additional, or specialist support are quickly identified and supported.

We have fallen short, but we are doing everything that Government would expect us to do in these circumstances. We are resolute in making the necessary changes to drive up standards and are making steady progress already.

Around 200 organisations have now signed up to the South Tyneside Pledge.

Pledgees have helped create over 50 new apprenticeships across the borough, increased spend with local suppliers, delivered talks in schools and provided work experience placements, launched innovative community initiatives and schemes for carers, and got involved in volunteering and the fight against climate change.

Launched in January 2022, the Pledge sets out nine commitments around encouraging organisations to spend, recruit and procure locally. It aims to boost local economic activity, reduce health inequalities, cut carbon emissions, and enhance civic pride.

And Pledgees are really making a difference by honouring their commitments.

There have been great examples of businesses supporting the community, such as local charity Emmaus launching a community launderette to help people with the rising cost of living, and energy consultancy Tritility supporting the Council's Holiday Activities and Food (HAF) Programme. A further 20 are giving back by volunteering, at local junior Park Runs and the Great North Run, hosting an arts event at the Customs House, volunteering with Friends of West Park and offering free sessions in schools.





Jarrow based business energy consultancy Tritility have supported a range of community projects as part of the South Tyneside Pledge including the Council's Holiday Activities and Food (HAF) Programme.

Use of local suppliers has also increased among pledgees, with over 20 using more local companies and 15 Pledgees winning more local contracts. with some businesses collaborating for mutual benefit.

The Health Insurance Group, a family-owned commercial insurance broker based at One Trinity Green in South Shields has since joined forces with two neighbouring marketing firms, Elite Branding & Sales and Far North. Since working with Elite and Far North, the Health Insurance Group has seen dramatic growth across all areas of the business, with the percentage of clients within a 15-mile radius of South Shields increasing from 1% to 10%.

Many organisations are also taking action on climate change and taking measures to reduce their carbon footprint such as converting to LED lighting, installing solar panels and introducing an electric car scheme. Groundwork has committed to training all of its staff and volunteers in Carbon Literacy.

Any organisation, big or small, public or private, can sign up to the Pledge and do their bit to champion the borough and help South Tyneside thrive.

The Council has been working to compile and share best practice, advice and information to help participants with their commitment, and has a range of events planned to encouraged networking and collaboration amongst Pledgees.


Become a Personal **Assistant in South Tyneside**


A Personal Assistant (PA) is someone who can support an older or disabled person to give them more independence and live their life more fully. PAs need to be good listeners, with a willingness to learn and respond.

The job can be very flexible, offering part or full-time work on different days and at different times. Some PAs work part-time, alongside another job. The role is also suitable for a student or retired person wanting a few hours a week.

The duties of a Personal Assistant vary widely and depend on vour client - what kinds of support they need and when. We currently have vacancies working with children and young people and adults offering a range of social time only posts or mixed care packages including personal care and social time.

Every adult should be able to live safely, free from abuse and neglect.

Research indicates that almost half a million people aged over 65 will experience some form of abuse or neglect.

- Incidents of abuse and neglect may be one-off or multiple, and affect one person or more.
- You can also be affected by more than one type of abuse at
- Abuse can be; physical, emotional, domestic, financial, slavery, sexual, neglect or self neglect to name a few and all involve using power to control or coerce a vulnerable person.
- Abuse can be face to face, online or via post (ie scams).

What can I do to help?

The best way to protect yourself or a loved one and stop abuse from happening is to tell someone about it. This may feel difficult, especially if the person abusing you is a close friend or relative, but abuse and neglect are never acceptable. You don't have to put up with it, and there is help available for you.

If you're unsure who to contact you can:





New Council homes under construction

The construction of 10 new council homes is underway in South Tyneside.

Preliminary work to prepare the site at Hindmarch Drive, Boldon, has already started.

The development will provide a mix of houses, apartments and bungalows, all with two bedrooms and parking facilities. Nine of the properties will have a private garden.

All the homes will be A rated for energy consumption and will use energy efficiency measures including air source heat pumps, solar panels and battery storage. They will all have electric vehicle charging points.

The homes are being built through the Housing Revenue Account, following changes to the cap on borrowing limits and grant funding provided by Homes England, and as part of the council's five-year housing strategy.

"We're delighted to be building 10 new homes for rent. These properties will suit the needs of a variety of residents and the energy efficiency of these properties helps us on our journey to a cleaner, greener South Tyneside."

£25m investment into Council homes in 2023-2024

Investment programme set to deliver £25m of works in the next year.

As part of our commitment to providing excellent services and quality homes where customers feel safe and supported, we'll soon be carrying out investment programmes in estates across South Tyneside.

This investment will include replacing kitchens, bathrooms, heating systems, windows, doors, and more. Rewiring, pointing, and roofing is also included in the programme.

Please be aware that we are also completing a separate programme of stock condition surveys to ensure that the information we have on your home is accurate. Keeping residents safe with TwinnedIt

Residents who live in our High Rise blocks have had a first look at the innovative new way we're monitoring fire and building safety!

TwinnedIt is an award-winning system which creates 2D and 3D drawings of buildings and holds essential safety information. This enables South Tyneside Homes to meet the needs of the Fire Safety Act 2021 and the Building Safety Act.

A great feature of TwinnedIt is that it allows our teams to share essential building and safety information with residents of our

high-rise buildings and the Tyne and Wear Fire and Rescue Service. This information includes things like personal emergency evacuation plans and building layouts.

The buildings have all been scanned and building and safety information is constantly being updated into the system. The system can be accessed from a smart phone, computer, or a tablet. Residents attended a demonstration event to see TwinnedIt in action ahead of the full roll-out in buildings.

Summer Recycling Tips

We've pulled together a short list to help you recycle right this summer



BBQ time

Last year disposable BBQs caused some concerns. For the safety of our crew, the public, our refuse vehicles and facilities **DO NOT** put disposable BBQs in ANY bin whilst still warm or hot. Leave it to cool completely.

Place in your grey household bin when it is safe to do so.

What can and cannot be recycled?

Empty bottles and cans can all be put into the blue recycling bin

> If you have any **leftover food** that you don't want to throw away, make sure it's cooled and stored safely. There's always inspiration for what to make with leftovers on www.lovefoodhatewaste.com

If you need to put food in the bin - use your grey household bin.

If you're getting rid of your old BBQ, take it to Recycling Village

at Middlefields. Please book your slot online.

We can't recycle plastic bags, nappies, garden furniture, paddling pools, patio furniture or old clothes/shoes.

You can recycle cardboard boxes, cartons such as milk, juice or fruit punnets and even yoghurt pots!

3 easy ways to reduce your food waste!



South Tyneside has more excess household waste than our neighbouring authorities. We would love all residents to reduce, reuse and recycle.

1. Use only what vou need

It may sound simple, but not overbuying is an excellent way to start reducing your food waste. Planning your meals can help and when looking at fruit and vegetables, buy single items or look out for smaller portions.

Only cook what you need to. It's useful to keep in mind a few basic measurements here – you only need around 75g of dry pasta per adult serving.

Did you know? Most packaging contains portion suggestions, so you can measure out exactly what you need.

2. Freeze batch cooking

Batch cooking can be a great way to use up surplus

ingredients - simply freeze the extra portions for a later date. Keep an eye on use-by dates for fresh produce too; if you're not going to be able to use something up in time, check whether it can be

frozen instead. Milk is an ingredient that often goes to waste.

Did you know? Milk can be frozen - look out for instructions on the side of the packaging.

3. Best Before date and use by date

Best before and use by dates are completely different. You can still eat foods for a while after the best-before date as they should be safe but they may have lost some quality. As long as the food looks and smells as you would expect, it should be safe to eat.



Keep an eye on the 'use-by' dates on the food in your cupboards. Don't eat any food that is past its 'use-by' date.



A lot of us welcome the warmer weather, but when it's too hot there can be health risks.

Hot weather can have adverse effects on all of us but especially for the very young, elderly or those with long term medical conditions. If hot weather hits this summer, make sure it does not harm you or your loved ones by following these top tips:-

- keep out of the sun between 11am and 3pm
- if you have to go out in the heat, walk in the shade and protect your skin with clothing, including a hat, t-shirt and sunglasses
- Use a 'high protection' sunscreen of at least SPF 30 which also has high UVA protection and apply it generously and frequently when in the sun.
- have plenty of cold drinks and avoid too much alcohol, caffeine and hot drinks
- eat cold food especially salads and fruit that has a high-water content
- take a cool bath or shower

Health Literacy

Health literacy refers to how well a person can find, understand, and use health information and services that they need.

In England, 42% of adults can't understand or use everyday health information. That goes up to 61% when numeracy skills are also required.

Guidance tells us the average reading age in the Northeast of England is lower than the national average, at between 9 to 11 years. To put that into context The Guardian Newspaper has a reading age of 14 and the Sun Newspaper has a reading age of 8.

The principles of Health Literacy are just as important to the council to make sure that we communicate with staff and our residents as effectively as possible

We want to help and empower all of our staff, and residents, to be able to make more informed decisions about their own wellbeing by making sure all of our information is easy to understand. We believe this is a basic right and will help make our services fair and inclusive.







Bag It! Bin It!

Dog fouling is a big concern, not just because of the mess it causes, but because it can also be a health risk...

What is the Council doing?

We know that residents are concerned over dog fouling in the Borough. The Council is committed to raising awareness about the issue of dog fouling and will respond reactively and pro-actively to reported incidents.

Dog Fouling Leads to Huge Fines

Failure to clean up dog mess has led to two South Tyneside residents being hit with fines and costs totalling thousands of

Mr F and Mr E were ordered to pay a total of more than £1,400 in fines plus a further £1,400 in costs, compensation and victim surcharges between them.

Mr F, of Spohr Terrace, South Shields, repeatedly failed to pick up his dog's waste from the street, despite being served with fixed penalty notices after members of the public reported him and he was caught on CCTV.

South Tyneside Council was left with no option but to take him to court after the fines went unpaid.

Magistrates ordered him to pay a £660 fine, £300 compensation to the council for clear-ups, costs of £350 and a victim surcharge of £264.

Mr E, of Northbourne Road, Jarrow, had previously been convicted by South Shields magistrates after he had allowed so much dog waste to build up in his back garden that neighbours complained about the 'unbearable' stench.

He continued to breach the requirements of the Community Protection Notice (CPN) and therefore South Tyneside Council prosecuted him again.

The case was heard in his absence and Mr E received a £770 fine as well as being ordered to pay a £308 victim surcharge and £200 costs.

What is Anti-social behaviour?

Anti-social behaviour is behaviour by a person which causes or is likely to cause harassment, alarm or distress to one or more persons not of the same household as the person.

Anti-social behaviour covers a wide range of unacceptable activity including, but not limited to:

- Nuisance, rowdy or inconsiderate neighbours
- · Littering or dumping rubbish
- Shouting or noisy behaviour in places where this might be annoying or upsetting
- Using rude, abusive or insulting language
- Threatening behaviour or bullying
- Excessively drinking alcohol alcohol-related trouble or buying and selling drugs

Our Community Safety and Tenancy Enforcement Teams work alongside Northumbria Police, as well as other agencies and residents in South Tyneside.

Our powers to tackle ASB

This followed a number of debate workshops in schools run by the Participation Team to equip children with debating skills.

Foster carer Emma Robinson followed in her parents' footsteps 19 years ago when she first decided to foster.

"The fact that my parents fostered definitely inspired me to go into fostering," she said.

"A lot of children don't see the help they can give to other kids. The rewards of fostering far outweigh the troubled times and I know I have enriched my own children's lives by fostering."

Emma's sister Claire and their cousin, Paul and his wife Paula, are also foster carers with South Tyneside therefore, Emma comes from a fostering family herself. Emma is able to recall the benefits to her growing up in a fostering household and was keen for her own children to experience this.

Emma and her husband Greg were part of the first Mockingbird model of foster care in South Tyneside which uses the concept of the extended family to provide additional structure and support for both carers and children.

Emma, 46, said: "The Mockingbird model is just fantastic in that it provides a wall of support, it's just phenomenal.

"The support from the fostering team has always been outstanding but Mockingbird means that there are always people around who understand the issues you are facing and can offer advice.
